A Letter from the Executive Director

Dear Friends.

Reflecting over the past few months on the many ministries we offer at Catholic Charities and the increase in services being provided, I am amazed by all the ways that we have assisted others in need. And I am even more surprised by how many volunteers share their gifts of time, talent and treasure to accompany us as we serve others in these beautiful exchanges of love of neighbor. You can read about many of these recent efforts in this newsletter. I am humbled and grateful for these many "angels among us." You make this ministry possible. You help us thrive.

These reflections have caused me to ponder: Why do we do what we do? Where did the call to serve come from? What is our inspiration to serve others in our Catholic Charities ministry? You have inspired me greatly over the past eight years, and I have been truly blessed by being part of it. The donors provided us with a great meal and gifted each staff member with a new Catholic Charities branded jacket.

Before the dinner began, one of the donors shared a little story, which was touching to the staff. One morning many years ago, she was traveling to work at 7:30 am and passed Parish Kitchen. Even at this early hour, the lights were already on there. She felt so moved because no matter the day, the weather, or the circumstances, the lights are on at the Parish Kitchen serving guests, 365 days a year.

She added that Catholic Charities keeps the lights on for so many people. Because of Catholic Charities, the lights are on at our St. Joseph Apartments, for families who were previously homeless. We provide a light at the end of the tunnel for parents in our parenting classes. We are the light to so many who face challenging situations through mental health counseling at our office and schools. We also keep the lights on at homes we helped save from foreclosure with our financial counseling.

What a blessing for our tenants to see faith in action by someone they do not even know. Many of these brothers and sisters of ours have experienced a lifetime of struggles. To watch an act of kindness such as this will stay with them for a lifetime.

How can Catholic Charities help with Your Housing Issues?

Behind on your mortgage due to loss of income because of COVID-19? The Homeowner Assistance Fund (HOAF) is a program created to mitigate financial hardships associated with the coronavirus pandemic by providing funds to eligible entities for the purpose of preventing homeowner mortgage delinquencies, defaults, foreclosures, and loss of utilities and displacements of homeowners experiencing financial hardship after January 21, 2020.

Qualified homeowners will be eligible for up to \$60,000 to pay eligible expenses caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. You must experience an annual loss of income of at least 10% and it must be due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Your income must be less than 150% of the area median income. If you need more information about this program, you can contact Patti Anderson, Catholic Charities Housing Counselor, at 859-581-8974.

Want to purchase your own home? Catholic Charities has classes for homebuyer education. The schedule is on this page. New homebuyers could receive grants of up to \$15,000 under the new ARPA Mortgage Assistance program. This new program is separate from but like the City of Covington existing Homebuyer Assistance Program, which has helped almost four hundred families buy homes since 2014. The city is keeping the existing program but adding a new program.

The federal requirements allow the city of Covington to offer the new program, consisting of a grant for up to \$15,000, in Qualified Census Tracts, or QCTs. In Covington, the following neighborhoods included are: Mainstrasse Village, Westside, Historic West 15th Street, Eastside, Helentown, Austinburg, Peaselburg, City Heights, Monte Casino, and parts of Latonia. Jail Ministry


Amazing Work!

I am in awe of the amazing work our volunteers do week after week. In the brief time we have been back in all three local detention centers, they contacted over 700 inmates in Boone, Campbell, and Kenton County counties. This includes bilingual volunteers who met with over 150 hispanic inmates in Boone County. Our teaching volunteers have graduated twenty-five men and women from the Kenton County MRT (Moral Reconation Therapy) program. This program teaches the men and women a new way to think about their lives and the world around them.

Due to staffing shortages at the Detention Center, we were unable to deliver in person Christmas snacks to the inmates at the Campbell County Detention Center this year. However this didn't stop Catholic Charities staff and volunteers from purchasing snacks for the inmates and staff and dropping them off.

If you know of someone looking for support due to having a loved one incarcerated, please encourage them to join our group the third Tuesday of each month from 6:30 pm-7:30 pm. It is truly a support group where people share experiences and feelings without judgment.
