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Catholic Charities Celebrates 85 years

Catholic Charities, Diocese of Covington held its annual campaign event, "Table of Plenty", November 17, at the Sterling Event Center: St. Barbara Parish, Erlanger. In 2016, Catholic Charities celebrated 85 years of providing healing, hope, love and compassion to those who need it the most.

Alan Pickett, executive director, and other staff members for Catholic Charities welcomed close to 170 friends and supporters. During the evening the new agency video was shown highlighting some of the programs provided by Catholic Charities. Jennifer Schack, from WLWT News 5, was the emcee.

"We are grateful for 85 years of Catholic Charities' ministry in our diocese," said Alan Pickett. "Tonight was a night to celebrate the many facets of this ministry. We truly are blessed to be the body of Christ, serving everyone in need with dignity and compassion. We are inspired by our Catholic faith, yet we could not do it without our many volunteers, our dedicated staff and our very supportive community partners and benefactors who all share in this ministry."

The occasion provided an opportunity for the agency to honor longtime volunteer Judy Rouse with the Marcella Strategier Angel of Hope Award and the Butler Foundation with the newly established Community Partner award.

Since 2002, Catholic Charities has recognized, in honor of Marcella Strategier, members of the community whose generous contribution of time, talent and treasure have advanced their mission.

Mrs. Rouse joined the advisory board member in the 1980's. During that time she was on the child placement committee of the board. Catholic Charities was making some changes in the practice of adoption, primarily moving to the practice of open adoptions. Mr. Pickett said that Mrs. Rouse gave wonderful advice and support as they moved through that process. Mrs. Rouse also volunteered as a speaker at their adoption home study classes for many years. In more recent years she has been known to volunteer around the office as well as on the cooking team.

"Judy and her late-husband, Brent, have been faithful and generous supporters of Catholic Charities for many, many years. We are very honored to present her with this year's award." Mr. Pickett said.

Catholic Charities began something new this year with the Community Partner Award, of which the Butler Foundation is the first recipient. This honor is awarded in recognition of an individual, company or organization that shares the values of Catholic Charities and had collaborated closely in partnership with Catholic Charities to make a significant difference in the community.

Blessed by God's Gift of Family | Celebrating Catho

Gene Guilfoyle met Mary "Mickey" Grove in 1953, and knew right away that there was something very special about her. While on their third date, a casual conversation about religion took a serious turn when Mickey remarked: "I am a Catholic girl, and I believe in my Church." Gene decided at that moment to become serious about his own Catholic faith because he had also decided that he would marry that Catholic girl. He remembers telling his father that night: "I have never met someone so good, someone who just exudes such goodness."

The couple married on September 3, 1955, and began to build a life on a foundation of their strong faith in God and their love for one another. Gene was employed as a pipefitter and Mickey as a PBX operator. They worked hard, saving money so that they could buy a home, and looked joyfully toward a future filled with children. When children didn't come along, and doctors told them that they never would, the couple turned to prayer for God's guidance.

Catholic Charities in the Diocese of Covington had a reputation for successful adoption outcomes, so they took their hopes for beginning a family to Catholic Charities. That choice provided a pathway to an extraordinary life for the couple when they met Mary Moser, Catholic Charities' first social worker.

Gene and Mickey adopted their first child, Mark, in 1960. He was followed by Scott in 1962. They fostered Melissa for three years until she was adopted by another loving family. Stephen began life with the Guilfoyles as a foster child and became a full-fledged family member in 1964. Susan came along in 1966, and Sally rounded out the family in 1968. Today, Gene and Mickey are delighted by the addition of 16 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren to their clan.

The key to this happy family? It depends on whom you ask. Mickey says the key to their happy life is that she and Gene have always gotten along. Gene says Mickey is an amazing woman for whom no job is too big or too difficult. The support of their parents and extended families was very important to their success throughout the adoption processes and their lives. Husband and wife each credit the other as the reason for their happiness.



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Family and the Butler Foundation is no secret; they truly give people a hand up and not a hand out. Whether it is through the Life Learning Center or through collaborating with many other local agencies and ministries, the Butler Foundation regularly ministers to the poor and strengthens our community."

In his closing remarks Bishop Roger Foys thanked everyone for the part they play in this ministry. "For 85 years and a 163-year history of the Diocese of Covington, we have had what is called Catholic Charities. Tonight, as we gather, we give thanks to God for all those who have been involved in any way with Catholic Charities," he said.

Catholic Charities has been led by a compassionate and knowledgeable group of professionals. The staff and volunteers open their arms to all people of the Diocese of Covington. Catholic Charities provides a safe and stable home for 16 previously homeless families at St. Joseph Apartments in Elsmere. Over 400 people received mental health or substance abuse treatment at the Latonia Office. School counselors provide vital mental health counseling and substance abuse prevention education to 16 schools serving grades K-12, both Catholic and public. The pregnancy counseling program provides emotional support to women experiencing an unplanned pregnancy and offers similar support to their family members.

Mercy Mat Ministry

Catholic Charities' newest volunteer ministry, the Mercy Mat Ministry, creates and distributes hand crocheted sleeping mats for the homeless. Each mat, crocheted from "plarn" (plastic yarn), measures approximately 6' x 9' and provides not only a cushioned, pest-resistant sleeping alternative to the ground or concrete, it is also a protective barrier against surfaces that are wet and cold. They are non-absorbent, lightweight, clean easily and roll-up for portability. The "plarn" is made from plastic grocery bags. How did such a ministry get started?



In November 2015, Catholic Charities' volunteer, Marlene Meyers, shared with Volunteer Coordinator, Lesley Duggan, how she started crocheting the sleeping mats earlier in May. While she enjoyed making them, her arthritis wouldn't allow her to make them as fast as she wanted. Fascinated by the idea and seeing an opportunity to grow Marlene's vision and passion into something to share, Lesley asked if Marlene would be interested in teaching others how to make the mats. Thus, the birth of the Mercy Mat Ministry, appropriately named for the Year of Mercy.

Since the ministry's first gathering in February 2016, many volunteers have joined helping in various capacities from collecting grocery bags to crocheting. The ministry has engaged residents at Madonna Manor, members of a Cursillo team, youth groups and high school service groups.

To date, 21 mats have been delivered to and distributed by Parish Kitchen. While this may not seem like many, they represent approximately 252 hours of crocheting and 12,600 grocery bags. Each mat requires around 12 hours of crochet time and 500-700 bags.

What has been the impact of the Mercy Mat Ministry in the community? Parish Kitchen Director, Troy Garrard shares, "We gave out four mercy mats today. One went to a gentleman who is 76 years old and is sleeping outside. He often helps unload donations for us and today he helped direct a delivery truck to our location. He was very appreciative. We gave another to a man who is disabled. He requires crutches to get around and sleeps next to the underpass directly adjacent to us. I often see him in the mornings while coming in to work."

Another story, "A woman came into Catholic Charities sharing her carpet cleaning business with the agency. While standing at the receptionist desk, she noticed a rolled up Mercy Mat behind the receptionist and inquired about it. Volunteer receptionist and Mercy Mat crocheter, Sheila Peeno, was more than happy to explain. Once the lady learned of its purpose and how they are made, she began to share the story of a woman she encountered and has attempted to help, a homeless woman in Florence, reluctant to go into a shelter and declining the offer of a hotel room because she doesn't want to give up her dog. After hearing the story, the Mercy Mat was given to her to share with the homeless lady. Truly feeling God directed her to Catholic Charities, not for the business solicitation but for the homeless woman, she left with gratitude and tears and the Mercy Mat over her shoulder."
