The Hidden Angels of the St. Joseph Apartments

Since 1948, the mission of Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Covington, has been to promote healing, restore hope and affirm human potential. Some of Catholic Charities' ministries such as the Parish Kitchen, Child and Family Services, and Counseling Services are long-established and well known. Others, such as the St. Joseph Supportive Housing Services, might be less well known. This ministry provides safe, stable, permanent housing to families impacted by homelessness and disability.

The St. Joseph Apartments consists of two eight-family apartment buildings in Elsmere; but that description is only part of the story. The life-changing experiences of the residents are the real story, a story written day by day. Brandy Medaugh is a Client Care Specialist and Case Manager for St. Joseph Apartments. She accompanies the residents on their journey from homelessness and hopelessness to a future full of possibilities. That dream becomes a reality through intensive case management which helps residents set goals and achieve self-sufficiency. Medaugh says that, without a doubt, the pandemic, economic conditions, and current events have made the last three years the most challenging of her career. Those dynamics have affected the ways in which she can serve her clients. Thank heaven, she has many hidden angels at her side.

The scope of a ministry that rebuilds lives from the ground up is enormous and requires many helping hands. There are large agencies whose assistance Catholic Charities cannot do without. There is also the blessing of those hidden angels who work in the background, appearing when needed most. When Girl Scout Troop 250 asked Medaugh about providing a worthwhile service project, she requested a small playground for the young residents. The Scouts provided the playground equipment; Lowes of Highland Heights provided the chain link fencing, post hole digging, and mulch installation. Working together, they built a safe playground where children can enjoy the simple pleasures of spending a sunny day with friends.

Medaugh says, "We have a huge relationship with the St. Vincent de Paul Society of Blessed Sacrament Church. If not for them, I truly could not do all that I do for the residents. They are amazing. I will give our contact, David Burridge, a call as soon as I know we will have a new family. Families calling on the emergency hotline are immediately connected with David, and he speaks with them to assess their needs. David and his volunteers pray with the residents and learn their stories. They bring them food and vouchers for clothing and furniture. Currently, St. Vincent de Paul is working with one of our residents to help have his car repaired through their car program. That is another cool blessing!"

Through Blessed Sacrament's Birthday Program, Sue Kathman makes sure that the children of St. Joseph receive a birthday cake, a gift, and a card: things that Mom and Dad can't provide. She is also available for various emergencies, delivers emergency food the day of the request, and helps with baby showers for new little ones.

Several years ago, a grant from St. Timothy Parish provided several picnic tables that created an outdoor dining space for residents. Now, Medaugh is working on a grant to pay for a simple gazebo over the dining space. That would allow her to move meetings with individuals from the small office space she shares with the residents' coin-operated laundry to the outdoors.



Medaugh's excellent relationship with her young residents' schools helps the children keep a good relationship with their school. The Erlanger/Elsmere School Districts' Families in Transition Coordinators, Shelley Werner and Jenni Nichols, help support the families needs.

Rosalie and her friends volunteer throughout the year to create Blessing Bags for the residents to celebrate birthdays and holidays. The simple bags contain personal care items, household goods, cleaning supplies, and prayers. Sharing the blessings of love she has received in her own life is Rosalie's way of letting the St. Jospeh families know that they have not been forgotten – especially on days of celebration.

Be Concerned of Erlanger helps residents complete the service hours necessary to keep their benefits going. And they invite new residents to visit the Erlanger thrift shop to select items that St. Vincent de Paul might not have available.

United Christian Volunteers, a non-profit, is located a walkable ten blocks away from St. Joseph Apartments. Medaugh says, "The director, Charles Lambert, is a really good guy. He helps our residents with food, basic needs, and a clothing voucher."

The laundry/office facility is also home to the St. Joseph Lending Library. As a service project, Claire Ruehl and her grandchildren set up and maintain the small library and keep up with residents' requests for reading material. They've read most of the books and are now hoping for history books, novels, and children's books. Claire and her family help new families feel welcome with cribs, beds, toys, diapers, and whatever they might need. Working with the CARE Closet in Newport, Claire has been able to supply most of those basic needs.

Common Spirit Health, formerly Catholic Health Initiative, initially partnered with Catholic Charities by offering assistance with landscape maintenance on the St. Joseph grounds. That assistance has grown into a friendship that supports each St. Joseph family at Christmas and with back-to-school supplies for the kids for the last four years.

The Knights of Columbus annual golf outing has been of tremendous support to women and children for decades. Now, the Knights' golf outing is the reason so many of the St. Joseph families have beds to sleep on, pillows to rest their heads on, warm blankets, shoes on their feet, and more. So many families enter the program with just a bag of clothing and the clothes on their backs. The Knights' annual golf outing allows families to get the basic needs for their new home and additional needs on their journey through the program. Documents, birth certificates, IDs, GEDs, education fees, shoes, medication, transportation, and summer camps: life's necessities the residents cannot afford are within their reach because of the Knight's generosity.

Brandy Medaugh says, "There are also those who support the community through prayers or contributions to the Diocese. They, too, number among the hidden angels of the St. Joseph Apartments: The small people who come with large gifts."

Catholic Charities Continues to Support Families Amid Changes

As of March 11, 2022, Bishop Iffert accepted our recommendation to discontinue the Adoption Program at Catholic Charities in the Diocese of Covington. This was no easy decision as we deliberated long and hard on ways to keep this program going. Despite this change, our commitment to supporting families continues. For couples who have asked for our help in the adoption process, and any future couples wanting to start a family through adoption, we will recommend other known adoption agencies, offer our clinical counseling services, and advise them about other adoption options such as adoption through foster care programs like DCCH.

We will likewise continue to offer clinical counseling services to any man or woman involved in an unplanned or difficult pregnancy to help them find the support they need.
