# A Letter from the Executive Director



## Charitable Works in Action – Celebrating 2025

Dear Friends,

Last year at this time, as we looked forward to 2025—the Jubilee Year and Pope Francis’ theme, Pilgrims of Hope—I shared my hope that we would create opportunities to encounter Christ through service and compassion. Pope Francis writes, “For everyone, may the Jubilee be a moment of genuine, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus, the ‘door’ (cf. Jn 10:7, 9) of our salvation, whom the Church is charged to proclaim always, everywhere and to all as ‘our hope’ (1 Tim 1:1).” He emphasized that mercy and works of compassion—feeding the hungry, visiting the sick, comforting the sorrowful—are ways we lead others to Christ and experience true transformation ourselves.

As 2025 draws to a close, we hope that our ministry has reflected this call. Thanks to the incredible generosity of our volunteers and benefactors, our mission has touched thousands of lives, offering hope, encouragement, and practical support to neighbors in need.

This year, more than 700 volunteers gave freely of themselves, reflecting the spirit of mercy in every act. In our Jail Ministry, 627 total volunteers visited 2,558 individuals where they served, offering friendship and spiritual support. Parish Kitchen served 50,686 meals. Pickett’s Corner distributed 425 bicycles. The Mobile Food Pantry reached 1,864 households, while St. Joseph Apartments benefited from property enhancements and a new multipurpose space. Behind the scenes, 65 volunteers supported administrative work.

Every volunteer, every gift, every hour of service matters. Thanks to you, 2025 has been a year of compassion, hope, and tangible impact. As we look to 2026, there is much to anticipate—and with your continued support, countless more lives will be touched by generosity and love.

# Building Community and Faith: Updates from Parish

Catholic Charities is thrilled to welcome Deacon Barry Henry as our new Director of Community Ministries and Outreach. Known throughout the Diocese for his leadership and compassion, Deacon Barry has served with Madonna House, Rose Garden Home Mission, and several diocesan boards. He and his family have also fostered infants for more than a decade, deepening his understanding of vulnerability and advocacy.

“What draws me to Catholic Charities,” he shared, “is the vital work of accompanying those most in need.” In his new role, Deacon Barry will oversee transformative programs such as Parish Kitchen, the Mobile Food Pantry, Jail Ministry, and Pickett’s Corner. He brings energy, vision, and faith to this mission.

As we look ahead, exciting developments are underway that reflect our vision and will strengthen several ministries. The multipurpose building is nearing the final stages of planning. Architectural drawings are complete, with only minor adjustments before construction begins. Our goal is to break ground in the first quarter of the year, marking a significant step forward in expanding our capacity to serve.

This new space will be a hub for ministry and outreach. It will house the mobile food pantry truck, ensuring we can reach neighbors beyond our walls. It will also provide storage and workspace for Pickett’s Corner volunteers, those involved in the bike ministry, who repair and distribute bicycles to individuals in need. By centralizing these efforts, we’ll create a more efficient and welcoming environment for volunteers and guests.

Another exciting addition is the prayer room, located on the northeast corner of the dining room. This quiet, sacred space will offer volunteers, staff, and guests a place for reflection, prayer, or conversation with Deacon Barry. “This room will be a refuge for anyone seeking peace or guidance.” For safety and privacy, the prayer room will be accessible only through the kitchen. There will be no outside entrance, ensuring a secure and respectful environment for all.

In addition to these new spaces, there are plans to install a divider between the kitchen and dining room. This feature will provide a dedicated space for meetings, prayer groups, and support gatherings at times separate from meal service. These changes reflect our commitment to creating flexible spaces that serve both practical and spiritual needs.

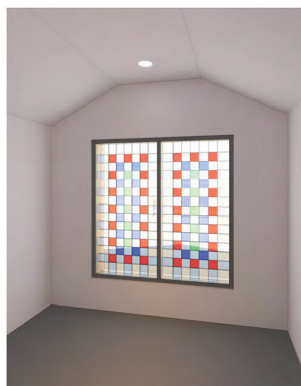

## Mobile Pantry Recap

The year 2025 was filled with challenges for the mobile food pantry, from inclement weather to federal budget cuts and the government shutdown affecting SNAP benefits. Despite those challenges, the spirit of giving remained strong. There were numerous people donating money to supplement our food distributions, including an anonymous group that donated \$12,000 which was enough to provide a turkey breast for every household that we served in the month of December.

Through all of these challenges, one thing continues to be consistent: our fantastic staff of volunteers. We are blessed with the over 150 volunteers who staff the pantries. They show up ready to work, most of the time the hall where we are hosting the pantry is set up prior to the food arriving. They assist in unloading the truck and prep for the pantry. They work tirelessly helping our guests pick up their food then assist them in their vehicle with their food. When the pantry has ended, they assist with inventory and loading any left-over food back on the truck. Then the hall is returned to the same condition we found it. We named our program Food For Friends to reflect the compassionate service of our staff and volunteers and the respect and dignity with which every guest is treated.

## New Jail Ministry Coordinator

Catholic Charities is excited to welcome Vince Lonnemann as our new Jail Ministry Coordinator! After retiring from a 38-year career in IT at Great American Insurance, Vince felt called to serve in a role that makes a direct impact on those in need. Already active as a volunteer visitor at Kenton County Jail, Vince brings a heart for ministry and a passion for supporting individuals and families during challenging times. We are grateful for his commitment and look forward to the meaningful work ahead!





# Program Updates continued

## Blessings with Wheels

Pickett's Corner ended 2025 on a high note, thanks to the generosity of donors and the power of community partnerships. Over the past year, 433 bikes were distributed to individuals in need with each one representing more than just transportation. Since the program began in 2023, a total of 1,138 bikes have been provided, creating opportunities for independence, employment, and hope.



One of the most memorable moments of the year came on December 18, when Pickett's Corner partnered with Rose Garden Mission for their Day of Giving. Together, they distributed 138 children's bikes, bringing joy to families and reminding everyone of what can happen when a community comes together.

The impact of these bikes is best expressed by those who received them. One recipient shared, "This bike is perfect. I got a job, but it's a 30-minute walk after I get off the bus. Now, I can bring the bike on the bus and ride just 10 minutes. I can take a later bus, get more rest, and not worry about being late."

Looking ahead, bike distribution will begin again in March 2026. Pickett's Corner is currently accepting new and gently used adult-size bikes. ## Reflecting Christ's Kindness

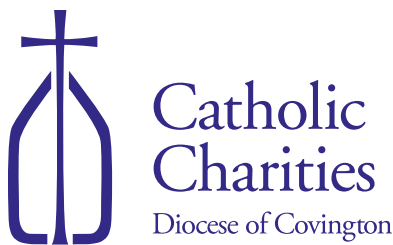
As a mental health counselor, one truth becomes clear very quickly: every person we encounter is carrying a story we cannot see. Beneath outward behaviors—irritability, withdrawal, defensiveness, or even rudeness—there are often layers of grief, fear, trauma, and exhaustion. When we are quick to take offense, we may miss an opportunity to show Christ's love.

Kindness, compassion, and empathy are some of the greatest gifts we can offer. They are not signs of weakness, but reflections of strength and grace. In counseling, we are taught to slow our reactions and ask, *What might this person be dealing with that I don't know about?* That same approach serves us well in everyday life. A sharp comment at the store, impatience in traffic, or tension at work may have far more to do with a silent struggle than with us.

This does not mean excusing harmful behavior or ignoring healthy boundaries. Instead, it invites us to choose curiosity over judgment and grace over reactivity. When we respond with empathy, we create space for understanding and, at times, healing—both for others and for ourselves.

As followers of Christ, our call to compassion runs even deeper. Jesus reminds us to love as He loves, even when it is difficult or unreciprocated (Luke 6:32–36). We may be the only glimpse of Christ someone sees that day. A gentle word, a patient response, or a moment of grace can quietly reflect His love.

Christ has shown us great kindness—undeserved, sacrificial, and abundant. May we extend that same kindness to all we meet, honoring both their humanity and the grace we ourselves have received.
